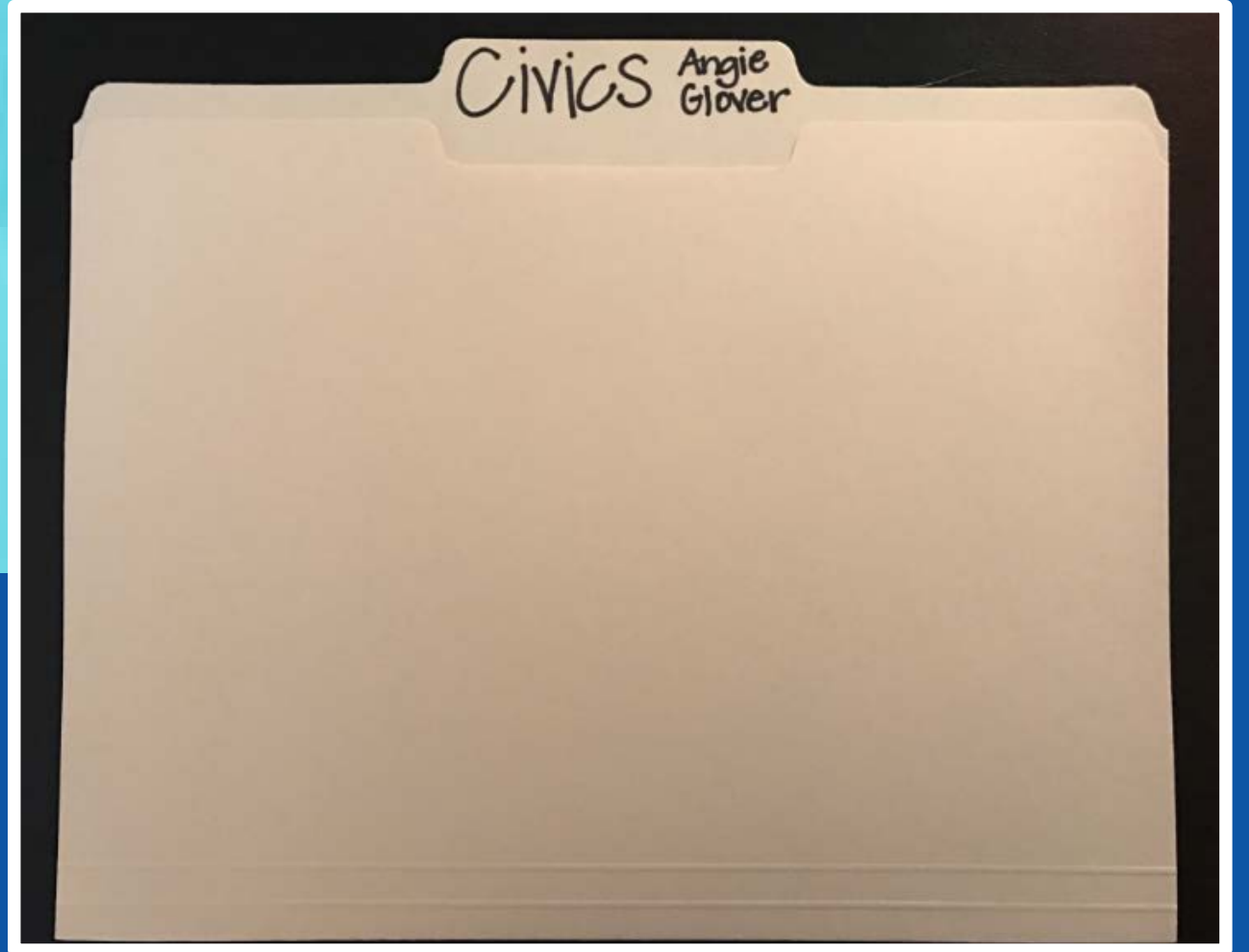

5. complete the instructions accurately

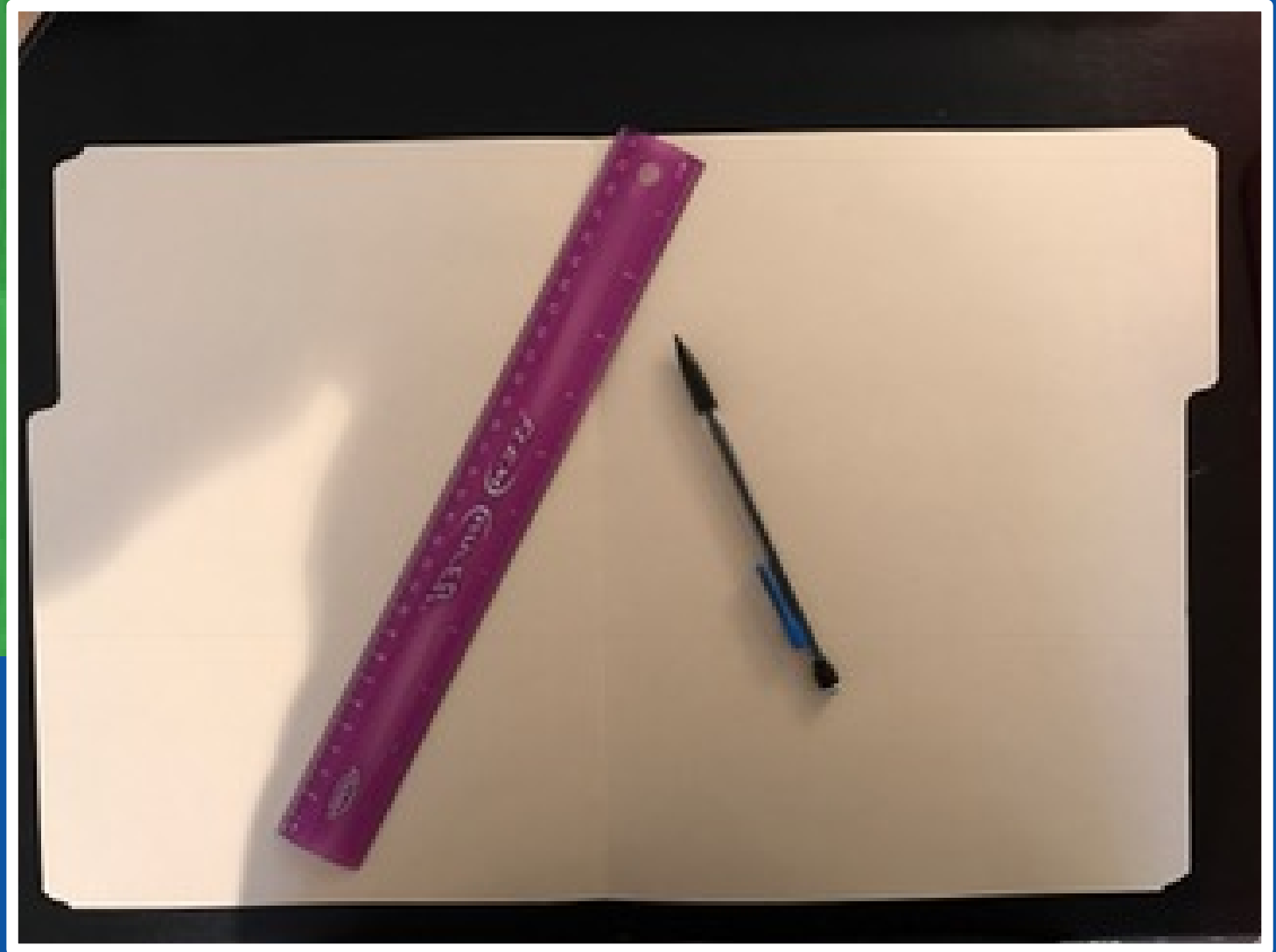
